



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# MESSAGE FROM ACCT BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND STAFF

It gives the Arab Community Centre of Toronto's (ACCT) Board of Directors and Staff great pleasure to introduce the 2018-2019 Impact Report. This fiscal year marks the ACCT's 47<sup>th</sup> year serving newcomers of all cultures, religions and ethnicities across the Greater Toronto Area.

In cooperation with communities, ACCT continues to assist families to build lives in Canada through a multi-service, inclusive and culturally sensitive approach. Through programming and service delivery, ACCT meets the changing settlement needs of newcomers. With an eye on the longer term impact, our work this year focused more on programming and strategic partnerships.

We introduced a variety of innovative programming for youth, women and families this year. We created TawasolChat and SawaWomen, two series of workshops that cover different topics to equip newcomers with pertinent knowledge and skills for day to day life in Canada. These programs are in addition to the weekly English Conversation Circles, Computer Classes and Citizenship classes offered to clients. We partnered with other organizations to carry out green projects in the city.

This year, we also introduced two in-house programs for youth and women: ACCT Youth and Walima. Previously known as the ACCT Kitchen Project, Walima is an economic empowerment program for newcomer women that utilizes culinary skills women already possess and equips them with business knowledge and improved English language skills. Upon completing the program they receive foodhandler certificates and go on to open their own catering business.

ACCT Youth was created to build skills, access leadership opportunities, and develop a sense of belonging within an engaged community of youth. Teens accessed our Youth Drop-In in Scarborough two evenings a week, martial arts classes in both our locations, Homework Club in Etobicoke, and ongoing educational trips across the city. Additionally, as creative self-expression is a priority for youth, we piloted Media Art for Newcomer Youth (MANY) this year and participated in the Myseum of Toronto's Intersections Festival for a second year in a row. With the dramatic increase in youth engagement at ACCT this year, our theme of this impact report is youth-focused.

We thank all of our partners, sponsors, and volunteers for their generous support. With your commitment and energy we are able to continue serving the ACCT community and achieve goals we set out for the organization.

Overall, the past year has been filled with program successes, new opportunities, a new level of enthusiasm and vision for the ACCT. We look forward to the new fiscal year and what it holds.

Established in 1973, the Arab Community Centre of Toronto (ACCT) is a non-political, non-religious, and non-profit organization that works with newcomers of all backgrounds across Toronto. In its early years, ACCT had set out to help Arab Canadians. 





#### Spotlight on Citizenship Classes

We facilitate citizenship classes in both our locations for community members to learn about Canadian history, geography, and improve their English language skills in a supportive environment. Students who take this class have a 95% success rate passing the citizenship exam. This year we ran 108 classes with a total enrollment of 667 clients.

#### Volunteer - Success Story

ACCT has over 200 volunteers who actively participate in providing services in interpretation, translation, assisting in events and office logistics.

Ubay Abdulaziz is a Syrian newcomer who landed with his family in Toronto in 2018. He heard about ACCT through friends and social media. Accordingly, he applied to become a volunteer with the organization. Ubay has actively participated in events, in providing interpretation services and assisting in office logistics. Having completed 60 volunteer hours with ACCT he was able to apply for job vacancies. Currently, Ubay works as a barrister at Starbucks and studies at Burnhamthorpe Collegiate Institute.

#### Spotlight on TawasolChat & SAWA Women

Realizing the pressing and expressed needs of newcomers to access opportunities that facilitate their economic and social integration into the Canadian society, ACCT initiated a new series of workshops entitled TawasolChat in September 2018. The main objective is to equip newcomers with the knowledge and skills needed, link them to educational and employment opportunities while raising their awareness on important issues pertaining to their Canadian day-to-day life.

The name TawasolChat is derived from the Arabic word "Tawasol" which means interacting in English and "Chat" reflects the informal and friendly nature of these workshops.

Under the umbrella of TawasolChat ACCT initiated its SAWA Women Support Group. The name of the support group "SAWA" is an Arabic word that means "together" to reflect the objective of bringing women together to share their experiences, interact and support and from the belief that together we can be stronger and make a difference.



## **PROGRAMS**

This year we established ACCT Youth and Walima Kitchen and prepared for introducing Walima by Seniors in our next fiscal year. These major programs mark a turn towards programming which reflects what is happening in the settlement and social services sectors. With holistic and innovative approaches to settlement, these programs have high engagement rate which involves the communities we work with.

#### YOUTH PROGRAM

Youth engagement has never been higher at ACCT! In April of 2018, we began building our youth program and started working with more youth than ever before. Our goal is to create and sustain anti-racist/anti-oppressive programing that youth of all backgrounds regularly engage in, not just access once.

ACCT Youth program is successful because it reflects the priorities and demonstrates a commitment to the lives of the youth we work with.

With 557 new youth clients, this demographic is supported through Instagram chat groups where we plan activities together and discuss issues they are facing.



## **Youth Drop-In**

The cornerstone of ACCT programming, our Drop-In is a safe space co-created with teens for newcomer youth to adapt to their needs. It is a place where youth can access leadership opportunities, socialize, play games, access computers for homework and recreational purposes, get help with resume writing and work permits, plan outings, discuss issues they are facing and earn volunteer hours We facilitate special workshops and events for youth based on their needs. Drop-In aims to alleviate isolation that newcomer youth often experience, and helps youth develop a sense of belonging. As our Scarborough office is located in an area with no targeted programs for newcomer youth, our Drop-In is the only programming close by for youth living in the area.

Drop-In developed organically out of an outreach session we held at the refugee shelters in North York. Through a participatory approach we invited youth to see our space in Scarborough and asked them: "What would you like us to change so you will want to hang out here? What would you like to do?", We followed up on youths' requests and witnessed the program take-off.



## **MANY - Media Art for Newcomer Youth**

Exhibition: December 3-15, 2018, Expansion Space, Toronto Media Arts Centre

MANY was a pilot program ACCT ran in collaboration with Charles Street Video over a period of five months. It reduced barriers to media art creation, supported youth through tailored workshops and one-on-one mentoring in English and Arabic, culturally affiliated artists and worked towards promoting the capabilities that youth value. MANY culminated in "I am happy here, now": Identity searching among newcomer youth in Toronto. This was an exhibition of youths' independent media art works. In their photography, animation and video projects, youth explore how they negotiate their sense of self during a time of rapid change, adolescence and (re)settlement. The program introduced youth to photography and animation as well as the arts sector in Toronto, helped youth form meaningful relationships with their peers and artist mentors and enabled them to access an opportunity

## "Finding where I need to be": Placemaking strategies of newcomer youth in Toronto

Exhibition: March 10 – 16, 2019 at the Scarborough Civic Centre

How do the experiences of newcomer youth in Toronto differ based on markers of identity and status? How are they similar?. "Finding where I need to be", a project in partnership with Charles Street Video for the Myseum of Toronto. The project addresses questions youth ask themselves through photography, pictures reflect the day to day habits newcomer youth engage in to make Toronto their home. The Annual Intersections Festival, seeks to address these questions through a photography project reflecting on the everyday practices Arab and African newcomer youth perform in order to make Toronto their home. The project contributes to knowledge about how to better support newcomer youth and humanizes migration, displacement, and settlement. The project was an opportunity for youth to express themselves in a medium they are interested in and have that self-expression



#### **Success Stories**

#### **MAJD ALSHEBLAQ**

Majid is a girl who has been involved with the ACCT programs since her family arrived from Syria three years ago. At that time, ACCT assisted her family with settlement and familiarized them with Toronto in an effort to make them feel at home.

Majid started attending ACCT's Homework Club to improve her English language skills. She focesed on developing her writing, reading and verbal skills. Later on, she joined the ACCT's youth summer camp, which enabled her to visit places she would not have otherwise known to explore.

Last summer, ACCT created MANY, a program for youth interested in learning about creating media art from culturally affiliated, Arabic-speaking artists. Majid has a keen interest in animation and was selected to be one of 10 youths in the program. During the program she learned the basics of photography and animation to develop a personal project. With the support of the artist mentor, she spent several months working on an animation video that illustrated her family's journey from Syria to Canada. The film was displayed in a public exhibition in December 2018 and was well-received by the audience. Majid proudly went on to show it at the Toronto Youth Shorts Festival in August 2019. She is now using the skills she learned in MANY to create compelling projects for school.

Majid's experience in MANY was meaningful to her because it helped her connect with people with similar interests and gave her the opportunity to reflect and share her story of displacement and migration with others.

#### **AMIR MUGHRABI**

Amir spends his time helping out because he has carved out a place for himself at ACCT and feels ownership in the youth programs offered at the centre. As a bonus, he is also collecting volunteering hours for school.

He is currently spearheading a youth-led initiative that aims to build youth confidence through sports. ACCT has a thriving group of youth who participate in programming and are active volunteers. Amir sets an example for other newcomer youths to integrate with Canadian Culture.

Amir took the lead as a youth representative in the Scotiabank Toronto Waterfront Marathon to raise funds for youth programs.

This year he was awarded a certificate for exceptional performance as a volunteer by MP Boris Wrzesnewskyj. This is how capacity is built in youth, when youth find meaning and purpose in the work they do and it comes from them, not other people.

#### **ACCT WALIMA**

Walima is a women's empowerment project designed to support newcomer women with low level of English language skills, lack of social connections and no Canadian work experience.

In Walima we offer wraparound services to women's settlement. We provide community cooking sessions for cohorts of 30 women that incorporate informal and occupational English language learning, safe food handling information and skills, small business start-up information as well as interfaith community engagement. At the end of the program we hold a sampling night for the public where the graduates have a chance to promote their food, culture, music, henna, arts and crafts, as well as interact with the wider community.

The success of this program is reflected in the pride women exhibit upon graduating, the high rate of women who set up their own catering businesses upon finishing the program, long waitlists for the program, and the broader community's positive response during the end of program sampling nights.



#### LAMA AL MULLA - THE FASHION CAKES

To the sound of pots and pans in the Kitchen, Lama El Mulla is busy decorating her cake to present at Walima's third tasting night at Bloordale United Church. Lama, an Iraqi convention refugee landed in Toronto from Jordan in September 2016.

A mother to three teens, her eldest daughter landed with her in Toronto, leaving her two boys behind with their father in Saudi Arabia. During the first year of her arrival to Canada, Lama's husband passed away. Lama struggled living in a new country, unemployed with poor language skills. Lama became so weak she would trip when walking in the street, and would not cook for her family nor leave the house.

Lama's friend who was a student at ACCT's Walima project told her about ACCT and their services. She introduced Lama to the Scarborough office and signed up for the new round of Walima's course.

Lama reflects: "From the first Walima session I attended, I felt I was back home in Iraq with family and friends, everyone was so warm and kind. I walked back home from the kitchen that day, and for the first time in a long time I cooked diner for my children".

Learning new recipes, and how to open her own business, Lama passed her foodhandler exam in the winter of 2019. She completed the Walima program having made new friends, gained experience and learned to express herself without fear, all while breaking the language barriers she faced.

Lama developed an interest in cake decoration, joining a course at ACSA to improve her skills. Having passed the course with flying colours, Lama opened her own cake catering business naming it "The Fashion Cakes".

Today, Lama also attends a sewing training course with Canada Goose and her daughter studies interior design.











## **Tree for Me**

We partnered with Toronto Parks and Trees Foundation (TPTF) for a campaign that enables Toronto residents to obtain native trees at no cost for their backyards. Tree distribution events were held across the city with the goal of achieving 40% tree cover in Toronto. ACCT had over 58 registrations with over 70 trees provided by TPTF. The event attracted ACCT neighbours, clients, as well as multi-faith communities.



## **Maalumat Qanuniyah**

A pilot project in partnership with Al-Qazzaz Foundation for Education & Development (QED,) Maalumat Qanuniyah aims to raise awareness on Canadian Family Law for Arabic-speaking newcomers. Knowledge gaps found in a focus group are addressed over five creative videos. The project addresses what Family Law in Canada stipulates as well as the similarities and differences between Canadian Law and Sharia Law and videos can be found on QED's Youtube channel.


